LYDIARD PARK

Lydiard Park is a beautiful historic estate on the western edge of Swindon, with the Palladian House, Church and Walled Garden, set in 260 acres of parkland.

THE WYVERN THEATRE

Opened by Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip in September 1971, The Wyvern Theatre offers a mixed programme of concerts, comedy, dance, drama, musical theatre and local amateur productions.

Coate Water Country Park is named after its central feature, a reservoir initially constructed to supply water to the Wilts & Berks Canal. Today, it serves as both a recreational area and a nature reserve, offering visitors a blend of leisure activities and natural beauty.
